

LEGAL COMMITTEE REPORT

TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE WILDWOOD SHORES PROPERTY OWNERS' ASSOCIATION:

Supplementing annual report of the Legal Committee rendered on June 24, 1961, it can now be reported that considerable progress has been made during the past few months, which, it is hoped, before the end of this year, will eventuate in formation of the Inter-Municipal Agency for the Development of the Lake Hopatcong area. A booklet has been prepared for general issuance shortly by the Division of State and Regional Planning of the New Jersey Department of Conservation and Economic Development. It explains that the official title of the new Agency will be the LAKE HOPATCONG REGIONAL PLANNING BOARD.

We quote below the letter which has been written by the Commissioner of the Conservation and Economic Development Department, which gives a further explanation of the prospective Board's powers:

"To the Mayors, Governing Bodies and Citizens of the Lake Hopatcong Area and the Freeholders of Morris and Sussex Counties:


"I am very pleased to transmit to you a report prepared by the Division of State and Regional Planning, at the request of the four Mayors of the municipalities surrounding Lake Hopatcong. This report makes a concrete proposal for an immediate step needed now to insure a formal organization concerned with and capable of accomplishing significant objectives in the planning and future development of the Lake Hopatcong area. I assure you of the continued recognition by the State, and particularly by this Department, of the responsibilities regarding the Lake and of our sincere interest in the future of the entire Lake area. I recommend your most serious consideration of the findings of this report."
